
Rebuilding Hose Cart #2

A Little History

The Fire Department was started in 1909. Both hose carts arrived in Friday Harbor in 1915. Each cart cost \$115.00 (approximately \$8000.00 in 2007 money). According to Bud Geneste, the carts were kept in his Carriage House on Harrison and 'C' street, because it was downhill to town from there.

This spring, the Museum received a wonderful gift from retired Fire Marshall Rick Galer: the restoration of a 90-year-old fire hose cart in the Museum's permanent collection.

The Firefighters pulled the Hose Carts, which carried 500 to 600 feet of 2 or 3 inch hose, at about 750 lbs., to the fire hydrant nearest to the fire, hooked up the hose, then pulled the cart with the remaining hose to the fire. Gene Wilson said that in the 50's and 60's they pulled the carts behind pickup trucks. (That would explain the welded 'V' brackets on the pulling pole.)

Fire Departments all over the Country had hand-drawn hose carts from 1880 through 1930's. Hose cart companies used to race to fires to see who could apply the 'first water'. They also had statewide competitions.

From the information I see on the internet, the old hose carts are now few and far between. Here in Friday Harbor we have the two original hose carts in almost original condition and the bill-of-sale to go with them.

Photographed Hose Cart #2 as is, upon arrival at my shop. I then wiped it down and lightly sanded it, looking for clues of color or existing paint and decoration. Set the frame up on two saw horses and removed the two wheels. When I took off the tool box it literally fell apart. The wood was so dry there was no glue left on the finger joints. The tool box may have been original to the cart, but the bottom and the way it was attached were not. Someone made adjustments some time in the 1940's or 50's.

The right side of the frame was welded at the axel joint and a "V" bracket was added to the front pulling pole. The entire frame was sanded and wire brushed.

It was then treated with a coat of linseed oil. After an hour the excess oil was removed. The frame was dried for three days, and then a coat of metal primer was applied followed by two coats of "Regal Red" Rustoleum oil base paint.

The axe and axe handle bracket were the only two parts replaced. The tool box was re-glued; a new bottom and top were built, all cleaned, lightly sanded, oiled and varnished. The proper fittings were collected and added to the box. The white pulling ropes replaced the old broken hemp lines.

Both cart wheels were sanded; one wheel had two small repair splices added. The other wheel required new fellows made of white oak. Both wheels received two coats of thinned Linseed Oil (1/2 paint thinner, ½ linseed oil), let dry for two days and painted with two coats of "Regal Red" oil based paint. The replacement axe and axe bracket were donated by the Friday Harbor Fire Department. The decorations are recreations of what I found during clean-up and some of what I thought fit. If kept inside, the cart should be good for another 100 years.

A Little History of Rick Galer

I came to Friday Harbor in 1980 and joined the Town Fire Department in 1981, then became interested in Fire Department History and Town History.

In 1984 I retrieved one hose cart and the 1923 Cadillac fire truck from the museum, borrowed Lawson's hay trailer and put the both of them in the $4^{\rm th}$ of July Parade, with the intent of raising money to finance restoring them.

By 1985 I became station Captain, and as luck would have it
Paul Whittier and his "Screen Door & Flying Machine Co." offered to rebuild the Cadillac and the hose cart. (Thank you to
Sam Fry for the work on the Cadillac and Ken Reynard for the work on the hose cart).

I served as the Town Fire Chief from 1990 to 1995 and as the San Juan County Fire Marshal from 1995 to 2005. Now that I am retired I have the time to go back to the Museum and finish the work that I started, i.e. rebuild the 2^{nd} hose cart and build a history display of the "First 50 years of the Town of Friday Harbor Fire Department".
